

Greetings Sisters in Christ,

As the seasons transition into fall, all of us seem to peer more than usual into uncertainty. Where are the sounds of football, the voices of children playing with friends, the scenes of holiday decorations, the gathering of friends for lunch, the ability to bid farewell to loved ones who have passed on, the opportunity for regular worship in our church buildings, the visits to shut-ins, the family gatherings marking important occasions? - Our 2020 DPCA Fall assembly will be offered as a virtual event by Prince of Peace in Gettysburg on Sat., October 24th from 9:00 to 12:30 via Zoom. There will be a business meeting which will include a discussion about proposing a slate of officers for election at the 2021 Spring Assembly. This will require a nominating committee, of which there should be representation from each chapter; a Chair will be appointed by the President.
- DPCA Service projects: New service project suggestions:
 - 1. Compose a prayer and send it to the sick, the shut-ins, people isolated by COVID-19, etc.
 - 2. Do it within our own parishes or individually.
 - 3. Consider becoming part of the bishop's Eliminate Racism Initiative
- **A mailing list** of all members has been created and will be used by President Linda Hoover to distribute (via email) items of importance; this will offload work from the chapter presidents and allow you to get information faster. (Chapter leaders will continue to inform members who do not use email.) The next step is to update the directory; Ross Fairweather is working on this now.
- **Triennial**: The DOK National Triennial will be held June 23-27, 2021 in Baltimore, Maryland. Province III is the host of this national gathering. Our diocese is in charge of Registration. The them is "come to the Table" based on Luke 13:29. Attendance is estimated at 350-400 (due to Covid-19), down from nearly 900. A decision will be made by the end of the year about moving forward with plans or cancelling due to a lingering pandemic.
- **2021 Province III** retreat is being planned for mid April. This event is needed for elections and will likely be held at a large church in the DC area.
- **How to serve** during quarantine: We are prayer warriors and as such, we should reach out with prayers, telephone calls, emails, hand-written notes, contact shut-ins.



Nehemiah Prayer Vigil 2020

We are encircling in PRAYER our families, churches, cities and our nation from September1st through October 22nd, a total of 52 days, so that the Holy Spirit can come into our country and bring about peace and healing. This is much like Nehemiah did in 52 days to bring peace and healing to the Jews in Jerusalem 450 years before Christ. Please refresh yourself by reading again the book of Nehemiah, and asking the Lord to show you how to pray. Luke 24:45 says, "Jesus opened the minds of his disciples to an understanding of the scriptures." What He did for them. He does for us, if we ask. Please join us in prayer.

Our Four Prayer Points:

1. Repent - of injustice, inequality, hatred, violence and racism

2. Restore - peace, civility, compassion; spiritual, physical and mental health.

3. Revive - sense of being one people - "One nation under God."

4. **Recommit** - daily to our motto, asking the Lord, "*What will you have me do?*" and asking the Lord to give you strength and courage to follow His direction.

From the Book of Nehemiah

1. Nehemiah's prayer: Chapter 1: "O Lord, I confess the sins we Israelites (USA), including myself and my father's house, have committed against You."

2. Nehemiah recruits families to do the work: Chapter 2: The people listened to Nehemiah, and they replied "Let us start rebuilding the walls." So they began the good work.

3. Nehemiah's confirmation of the work: Chapter 2: "The God of heaven will give us success. We will start rebuilding."

4. Nehemiah is helped to restore 9 gates around the broken walls: Chapter 6: "So the wall was completed in 52 days!"

5. Ezra opens the Book of the Law: Chapter 8: "All the people stood up and listened to the Word of God; all the people lifted their hands and shouted Amen! Amen! Then bowed down and worshiped the Lord with their faces to the ground."

6. Nehemiah encouraged the people to take a day of rest and celebration. Because the Lord was overjoyed with the worship of the people, Nehemiah said, "Do not grieve, for the joy of the Lord is your strength!"

7. The people agreed to obey the commands of the Lord. Chapter 10 "We will not neglect the house of our God."

Daughters, we are building walls of Prayer around our families, our churches, our cities, and our nation from September 1st - Oct 22nd, a total of 52 days, so that the Holy Spirit like Ezra can come into our country and bring about peace and healing! Please join us. (cont'd next page)

News from Harriet Lane Johnston


During this time of unprecedented and ongoing COVID-19 uncertainty, suspension of church services, social distancing, and racial injustice and tragedy, the Harriet Lane Johnston Chapter has maintained a wonderful communication through prayer, invitations to zoom services, and reaching out to those in need by email, notes and calls.

We have followed and prayed for a father and son in their path to a restoration to health following injuries sustained on a hike, we have prayed for the safe return of daughters who traveled home following the initial outbreak of the virus, we have prayed for some of our sisters who are experiencing fears for a spouse's health, and then thanksgiving for a successful outcome of a surgery, for sisters who have sustained a loss, and for sisters who have been affected by business limitations and closures. We have continued our prayer list and communicated with each other when additional prayers are requested. Some of us have made masks for distribution to agencies and others in need, we have knitted prayer shawls, participated in back-to-school programs, and reached out to others less fortunate. Several daughters have found online courses and new sources of prayer and comfort. Many of us have taken part in Zoom services, including evening prayer and Compline. We have also explored beyond our own churches and worshipped with the National Cathedral, St. Thomas Episcopal Church in NYC, and Trinity Wall Street. Some of us are now venturing back to church and experiencing the new norm of masks and passing the peace by waving.

Our twice a month gatherings have been specifically designated to prayer, with services offered by several of the sisters, and so, we are experiencing ever more deeply what it means to be a Daughter of the King as we explore a wider range of living into our dedication to prayer, evangelism and mission.

Most recently ten of us sat in a circle in the openness of a park and shared our fears, our sadness and worries, but then all of that was tempered by the joy of being together and sharing prayers. Later this month, we will come together for a service of healing and sharing in the Eucharist.

While this has certainly been a time of exploration and soul searching, we have all been uplifted and sure of the love of our Lord, who supports us all



the day- long. We pray 'Thy Kingdom Come' with new understanding, awareness and purpose.



Habits of Grace, ... from Presiding Bishop Curry

July 26., 2020

Earlier this week, I was preparing a very brief meditation for a kind of public service announcement on prayer in the time of pandemic. And as I was preparing, something dawned on me that I wanted to share with you. There are two instances and there may be others to be sure, in both the Hebrew scriptures and in the New Testament where you see prayer linked directly with action.



One example is found in First Kings where the prophet Elijah is fleeing for his life. He, in Chapter 19, says he ends up at a cave near Mount Horeb, which is Mount Sinai in other places. And there for 40 days, he's in prayer, fasting and struggling. And after that time of prayer, when he kind of senses what God wants him to do, he then goes out and leads a reformation in Israel that was really significant.

His prayer led him to action. You see the same kind of pattern in Jesus in the garden of Gethsemane, he's praying about what he should do. And that leads him to make the decision to give his life, to show what love looks like for the cause and way of love. But it's that prayer that leads to action. It occurred to me that in this time of pandemic, it may be helpful to remember that our prayer can lead to actions. We can't do all the things that we used to do, but we can do some things. We can pray, pray for all of the conditions and all of the situations that we are aware of in our world, and that we are aware of because of this pandemic, but also take some action. There are ways we can support causes that help people in this time.

There are ways that we can support ministries that are helpful, but there's some simple ways. We can keep social distance. That's a way of action. It's an act of prayer. We can pay attention to public health officials and their guidance, that's an action. And we can wear, of course, these. We can wear these face masks. And so I was trying to think of what is a prayer that combines prayer and action in the Book of Common Prayer? And I found it, there are many, but this one stands out.

It's the prayer of St. Francis:

Lord make us instruments of your peace. Where there is hatred, let us sow love. Where there is injury, pardon. Where there is discord, union. Where there is doubt, faith. Where there is despair, hope. Where there is darkness, light. Where there is sadness, joy. Grant that we may not so much seek to be consoled as to console, to be understood as to understand, to be loved as to love. For it is in giving that we receive, it is in pardoning that we are pardoned, and it is in dying that we are born to eternal life.

Pray and do what you can.
