#### 148<sup>th</sup> Annual Convention Scottish Rites, Williamsport, PA Saturday, October 19, 2018

At 11:13 am, the Rt. Reverend Dr. Audrey Scanlan, Bishop of the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania, opened the 148<sup>th</sup> Annual Convention with a prayer. The Secretary confirmed that a quorum was present.

Reverend Canon Gregory P. Hinton reported on the Courtesy Resolutions set forth in the Convention packet. After motion duly made and seconded, Convention delegates adopted the Courtesy Resolutions.

In accordance with Article III, Section 3 (D) of the Constitution of the Diocese, the Bishop appointed Charles G. Banks, Jr., Esquire as Chancellor of the Diocese, to hold office until the next annual Convention of the Diocese and until his successor is appointed by the Bishop.

The Chancellor appointed Barbara McLemore, Esq. and Thomas Schmidt, Esq. to serve as Vice Chancellors.

The Treasurer presented the report of the Finance Committee which includes the Diocesan Budget. After motion duly made and seconded, the Budget was approved by Convention Delegates.

The Bishop presented her address to the Convention. The complete text of the Bishop's address immediately follows.

Dear friends,

It is a dangerous spot to be in- the last item on the agenda, after a long day.

It is a little frightening to be the only thing that is between you and your journey home, after weighty business and, for most of us, with the anticipation of a full day tomorrow.

It is the style of these addresses to reflect on the year past... that is good, and/but I am more interested in launching what is **ahead** for us. For that reason, I'm happy to be the tail on this dog, the period at the end of this day's sentence, the book of Revelation instead of Genesis.

I've got just a few minutes.

Let me reflect, briefly on what's been... and then move us forward.

Last year, at our Convention, we spent Friday evening dwelling in deep questions about what mattered to us-personally, in our parishes, and as Convocations. The result of that work, through an in-depth analysis was to **maintain** some programs that are serving us well, like our Stevenson School for Ministry, Social Justice ministries that are reaching out to the world, include some **new initiatives** like the Invite, Welcome and Connect seminar for parish development, and to **craft a budget** that affirms the three

broad priorities that were named (the outcomes of our work together)... the priorities of: deepening relationships with God, continuing to develop parish vitality, and cultivating ways to bridge the widening gulf between church and society. It was good to spend time together discussing these matters of the heart, and then, encouraging our Council to find ways to be responsive to them, making decisions about our common resources. I hope that, as individuals, and as parishes, you will take advantage of the opportunities that we support, collectively, and that are offered for yourself and for your parish families as we grow as the Body of Christ. I am feeling very good about our work together in this past year and I am very hopeful for what is next.

In this past year, my "episcopal acts," (as the term of art is called,) have been filled with joy. I have stood at the font and watched our parish priests baptize new members in our Body and then I've gotten to smear the baptisands with fragrant, slippery, holy oil, anointing them and marking them as Christ's own, forever. I have laid my hands on the heads of earnest adolescents and adults, all eager to confirm their faith in Christ Jesus. I have welcomed dozens into the Episcopal tradition with a handshake and blessing, been part of four ordinations in our diocese and in the ordination of two brother and sister bishops in our Church, and I have celebrated God's Holy Meal at many of your altars this year. I have been with you as we have rejoiced again at the birth of the babe in the manger; stood in awe, shoulder-to-shoulder with the Magi; walked through the wilderness of Lent; agonized at the foot of the Cross, and been moved by the mystery of God as the sun rose over the hill and we got our first look at the empty tomb of Easter... I have, with you, been thrilled and surprised by the power of the Holy Spirit- not just at Pentecost, but in the moments when we have least expected it, and when we have needed it the most. We have known God's grace, and mercy, and blessing. It has been a privilege for me to wade in the middle of your lives-our lives- in God, and to be your bishop.

There are some key words that I have identified for our future together- you heard them at the end of my sermon at our Convention Eucharist earlier today:

discovery, experimentation, creativity, and collaboration.

These are real words- not something I found on the back of a glossy book jacket- they are **real words**, springing from my heart- and I believe that they are vital for the next chapter of our lives in Christ as the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania.

#### Discovery, Experimentation, Creativity and Collaboration.

Here's the long view: My vision is for us to be a diocese- The Body of Christ- working for and worshipping God, in a way that is vibrant and right-shaped for us.

Let me offer that again:

My vision is for us to be a diocese - The Body of Christ - working for and worshipping God, in a way that is vibrant and right-shaped for us.

We deserve nothing less. Our neighbors, whom we serve, deserve nothing less. And, certainly, *God* deserves nothing less.

We have more than glimpses of this already in our diocese: The Gleaning Project through Feed my Sheep. The Community Café in State College. The Beacon in Altoona. Thanksgiving dinner in Coudersport. Easter Lunch for First Responders in York. A health clinic. A spiritual life center. Little Pantries filled with food outside of some of our churches. Mission trips to far-away Puerto Rico and close-by Jersey Shore.... We have growing children's programs- (the first in a long while at this very Convention), a robust program of Happening for our Teens (we are up to offering our # 12th this year and the second Jr. High "New Beginnings" Retreat.) Our Cathedral School is growing and strong. We are serious about Eliminating Institutional Racism: we are looking to move beyond programs that simply educate us, and towards achieving an anti-racist identity for our diocese that will claim and demonstrate that we are all equal in God's eyes. We are digging into all sorts of Social Justice work that affirms the dignity of every human being: gender equality, support for refugees, affirmation of the LGBTQ community in our Church, and, with the work of this Convention, we are establishing new committees to deepen work in Creation Care, Ministry to the Aging, and Evangelism and continue our ministry to the aged. These are

more than glimpses, they are shining pictures of our hands at work, building the Kingdom.

We are working for and worshiping God, in vibrant ways.

The words **Discovery**, **Experimentation**, **Creativity and Collaboration** call us to something slightly nuanced, that will, I believe, help us to fulfill the rest of the vision: to be **right-shaped**.

God spoke through Jeremiah and said to God's people:

<sup>11</sup> For I know the plans I have for you," declares the Lord, "plans to prosper you, not plans to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future." (29:11)

When I say that I am praying for a diocese that right-shaped, what I mean is that I want us to be well-fit, equipped and appropriately resourced as God's people in a configuration that makes sense and that promotes vitality. We need to be well-designed, for the place and the time into which God has called us. We are not the Diocese of Nevada, or SE Florida, or Maine or Montana. We are the Episcopal Diocese of Central Pennsylvania: 175 miles wide, 225 miles long, filling 24 counties and serving people in our urban centers and in rural communities. We are serving God *today*: not in the last century, nor in the next, but right now. Right here. And so, it is our work, in this season, to discover the best way to do that.

We will experiment some. We have, already. We learned that a program of Mission Resource Teams was, perhaps, something too big and wide-reaching for us to grab hold of in this last year. In spite of some great attempts, we couldn't get it off the ground. And so, taking the lesson from that to start small, we are encouraging more regional, local projects, experimenting with other ways to work together; - we are "Coming Together in Mission." The convocations have chosen some exciting projects to try on: a bluegrass festival and workshop in the North, a prayer walk through this city of Williamsport to pray through the Opioid public health crisis, an outreach effort through ALERT to care for hurricane victims in North Carolina, and a series of liturgical gatherings in another region to draw closer to each other through common worship. These experiments have at their heart, collaboration and community building, in the Name of Christ. These are creative, collaborative ideas that are drawing us out. And, I've got some skin in the game as well: on the third Wednesday afternoon of each month, you can find me somewhere in our diocese in our new "Bishop Out Of The Box" initiative, praying with people on the streets, in parks, down by the river, and trying out new- and sometimes crazy- ideas: stay tuned for the Thanksgiving Video that we will make in Lancaster in November, our Living Nativity in December, and who-knows-what (hot chocolate and prayers?) in January. Experimentation. Creativity. Stretching a bit- for Jesus.

The Way of Love, that you've heard me talk about, is this year's course for us to come together, as One Body, through spiritual practices to give us shared experience of a deepening faith. Please bring that home- The Way of Love- and try it on: all seven practices: turning, learning, praying, worshipping, blessing, going and resting.

And... (I'm almost through, hang on!) for those who take the idea of journeying literally, we are in the planning phases of an **Appalachian Camino**- an early summer pilgrimage hike through our diocese on the Appalachian Trail, as we join together, footfall by footfall, growing closer to Jesus and each other. If you like the idea of a Camino but aren't much on hiking, stay tuned for news about how we will be gathering at the end of each day's hike for food, fellowship and prayer in one of our Episcopal Churches along the way where all will be welcome to share.

I'm ready- to journey on the Way of Love this year. I'm ready- to focus on turning, learning, praying, worshipping, blessing, going and resting- with all of you- as we continue vibrantly serving God, loving neighbor and welcoming all that God has in store for us.

To God be the Glory.

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The Reverend Gene Tucker indicated that a committee will present a report regarding the implementation of the recommendations set forth in the Bishop's Address to Convention.

The Secretary announced that the next Annual Convention is scheduled for October 20-21, 2019, in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania. The Secretary call for a motion to destroy the ballots. After motion duly made and seconded, Convention delegates approved the motion to destroy the ballots. After a closing prayer, the Bishop adjourned the Convention.

#### 2018 RESOLUTION #1 COMMENDING THE EPISCOPAL HOME AS A DIOCESAN MISSION

BE IT RESOLVED, That each family unit in the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania endeavor to commit at least \$25 a year to the Episcopal Home; and be it further

RESOLVED, That each parish in this Diocese include the Episcopal Home and its residents in the parish's weekly Prayers of the People; and be it further

RESOLVED, That parishes and parishioners throughout this Diocese avail themselves frequently to the website of the Episcopal Home, episcopalhome.com, in order to learn what outreach projects can be provided to the Home by caring individuals, parishes and convocations.

EXPLANATION

The Episcopal Home was founded in Shippensburg in 1927; and since its' founding, has been the residential haven for countless persons in their elderly years, years when living alone becomes unsafe and perhaps unpleasant.

Today, the Episcopal Home is a personal care home which can accommodate 32 residents. During the past few decades, the Episcopal Home administrator and board of directors have been confronted with rising costs while realistically facing the inability of several of its residents to pay the full monthly fee. An annual donation of \$25 from each family unit in our Diocese would provide sufficiently for the Episcopal Home to continue on a year to year basis

August 5, 2018, was designated as Episcopal Home Day throughout the Diocese and such a day will henceforth be so designated annually, as a day for donations, prayers and sermons to be offered on behalf of the Home; and in addition to this annual day, prayers for the Episcopal Home and for its residents during weekly Prayers of the People, along with ongoing outreach efforts by each parish, will enrich the lives of Episcopal Home residents greatly.

Look with mercy, O God our Father, on all whose increasing years bring them weakness, distress, or isolation. Provide for them homes of dignity and peace; give them understanding helpers, and the willingness to accept help; and, as their strength diminishes, increase their faith and the assurance of your love. This we ask in the name of Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen. (BCP, p 830, #49)

#### 2018 RESOLUTION #2 URGING LOVING CARE OF THE AGING

BE IT RESOLVED, that parishes throughout our diocese commit to safeguarding the elderly, by awareness, by conversation, and by offering courses regularly in Safeguarding God's People. EXPLANATION

Pennsylvania is a slow growth State with the exception of residents who are 65 or older; the senior citizen population of the Commonwealth grew by 13.5% from 2010 to 2016, while Pennsylvania's total population rose just 0.6% over that span, according to a recent report from the Pennsylvania State Data Center; and so there are now 2.2 million people age 65 or older in Pennsylvania, representing 17.4 of the total population.

These demographics demonstrate the rising need for social justice for the elderly and a coordinated effort to identify and eliminate elderly abuse. The inevitable weakening of the elderly makes them vulnerable to mental, physical and financial abuse by strangers, caretakers, and even relatives.

The Diocese of Central Pennsylvania has a tradition of immense dedication to the needs and welfare of the elderly; and The Episcopal Church, especially in this diocese, has shown great commitment to Safeguarding God's Children and has courses available in Safeguarding God's

#### People.

The widespread use of Safeguarding God's People courses will help clergy and laity give renewed consideration to the needs and welfare of the elderly senior members of their congregations who, in their younger days, were the lifeblood of our parishes. Happy are they who consider the poor and needy! The Lord will deliver them in the time of trouble. Psalm 41, v. 1

#### 2018 RESOLUTION #3 EQUAL GENDER RIGHTS

BE IT RESOLVED that the 148th Convention of the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania, in response to action taken by the 78th, 77th, and 75th General Conventions of the Episcopal Church, implement a yearlong funded, two-fold study of the diocese's adherence and endorsement of Resolutions 2015-A032, 2012-A143, and 2006-A139; and be it further

RESOLVED that the study compare current compensation for ordained women and men in our diocese, to ascertain gender-based discrepancies of our diocesan hiring practices and be it further

RESOLVED that the study appraise our diocese's and congregations' search and call practices over the past ten years, looking specifically at applicants, finalists and those selected and their letters of agreement, for gender impartiality in the first two and for salary and compensation in the third instance, together with size, location, and vitality of the church in each case; and be it further

RESOLVED that the Standing Committee receive and review the report prior to the convening of the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania's 149th Annual Diocesan Convention; and be it further

RESOLVED that the Standing Committee report its findings to the Diocesan Bishop as well as to the Council of Trustees and other essential diocesan commissions, committees, and convocations as is deemed necessary; and be it further

RESOLVED That the 148th Convention of the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania request the Standing Committee on Program, Budget and Finance to consider a budget allocation of \$2500 for the implementation of this resolution

#### **EXPLANATION**

The 78th General Convention of The Episcopal Church resolved to make available sufficient resources to empower to develop a network catalyst to existing programs across the Church, mobilizing women leaders, both lay and ordained; and the 77th General Convention of The Episcopal Church directed the Office for Transition Ministries, the Office of Pastoral Development and the Executive Council Committee on the Status of Women to develop and distribute a Search Toolkit for church leadership discernment committees and female clergy applicants

The 75th General Convention of The Episcopal Church offered thanksgiving for the gift of all women in ministry, and especially those enabled by General Convention action including the seating of lay women deputies in 1970, the canons enabling the ordination of women to the diaconate in 1970, the priesthood in 1976, the consecration of a woman as bishop in 1989, and the election of a woman as Presiding Bishop in 2006; and resolved, that all dioceses be encouraged to celebrate these ministries in ways that are appropriate to their locale.

Given these statements, and yet coincidental evidence from many sources suggesting that there are still ongoing subjective and objective gender-based incongruences across The Episcopal Church; The Standing Committee of The Diocese of Central Pennsylvania calls for a yearlong funded, two-fold study of the diocese's adherence and endorsement of the aforementioned denominational resolutions. The principal purpose of this study will be to determine whether diocesan and congregational bodies as well as other ecclesiastical organizations in relationship with the diocese are justly and equally treating ordained women with men. We propose more specifically:

- a) A comparison of current salary and compensation for ordained women and men in our diocese, to ascertain the justice of our diocesan hiring and compensatory practices.
- b) An appraisal of our diocese's and congregations' search and call tendencies over the past ten years, looking specifically at applicants, finalists and selections and their letters of agreement, for gender impartiality in the first two and salary & compensation in the third instance, together with size and location of the church in each case.

This evaluation will provide evidence factoring whether women are treated without harassment including their ability to qualitatively and quantitatively seek equivalent vocational opportunities as well as for such women to live out their calls to ordained ministry in the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania, especially in vital congregations.

The Standing Committee will receive and review the report prior to the convening of the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania's 149th Annual Diocesan Convention in 2019. The Standing Committee will report subsequently its finding to the Diocesan Bishop as well (if necessary) to the Council of Trustees and other essential diocesan commissions, committees, and convocations.

There are evidentiary sources suggesting gender-based incongruencies across The Episcopal Church. This study's purpose will determine whether diocesan and congregational bodies as well as other ecclesiastical organizations, as feasible, (Neighboring Episcopal dioceses and denominational entities such as the Lower Susquehanna ELCA Synod) are justly treating ordained women with men. This evaluation will consider evidence factoring whether women are treated without harassment including their ability to seek equivalent vocational opportunities as well as for such women to live out their calls to ordained ministry in the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania, especially in vital congregations. Acts of General Convention referenced:

2015-A032 Establish a Women's Ministries Staff Position

Resolved, That the 78th General Convention direct the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society to establish an independent contract employee or staff position for women's ministries and networks in the amount of \$150,000 for the triennium; and be it further

Resolved, That this person be empowered to serve as a network catalyst to existing movements and programs across the Church, mobilizing women leaders, both lay and ordained; and be it further Resolved, That the 78th General Convention request the Joint Standing Committee on Program, Budget and Finance to make available sufficient budgetary monies to the Executive Council Committee on the Status of Women to provide additional seed money to be used to create a self-sustaining model for a vibrant network of women's ministries across the Church.

2012-A143 Develop a Search Tool

Resolved, That the 77th General Convention direct the Office for Transition Ministries, the Office of Pastoral Development and the Executive Council Committee on the Status of Women to develop and distribute a Search Toolkit for church leadership discernment committees and female clergy applicants; and be it further

Resolved, That the 77th General Convention request the Joint Standing Committee on Program, Budget and Finance to consider an allocation of \$5,000 be budgeted for the implementation of this resolution. 2006-A139 Celebrate Women in Ministry

Resolved, That the 75th General Convention of The Episcopal Church offer thanksgiving for the gift of all women in ministry, and especially those enabled by General Convention action including the seating of lay women deputies in 1970, the canons enabling the ordination of women to the diaconate in 1970, the priesthood in 1976, the consecration of a woman as bishop in 1989, and the election of a woman as Presiding Bishop in 2006; and be it further

Resolved, That all dioceses be encouraged to celebrate these ministries in ways that are appropriate to

their locale; and be it further

Resolved, That pioneers in the ordination of women in all orders be part of this celebration and that their witness and courage be recognized; and be it further

Resolved, That dioceses that as yet have not ordained women to the priesthood continue to be encouraged to provide for the ordination and exercise of priestly ministry by women in their dioceses.

#### **EXPLANATION**

The following are resolutions from the 79th General Convention concerning Care of Creation, advocacy, practice, and funding sources:

C008 Advocacy for Creation Care

Resolved, the House of Deputies concurring, That the 79th General Convention in keeping with the House of Bishops' 2011 commitment to combat climate change urge that the members of The Episcopal Church strive to transform our individual and communal lives towards sustainability; and be it further

Resolved, That Episcopalians be encouraged to use a web-based tool to support healthy, sustainable choices; and be it further

Resolved, That the General Convention request that the Joint Standing Committee on Program, Budget and Finance allocate \$30,000 to be devoted over the triennium 2019-2021 to make a web-based carbon tracking tool such as "Sustaining Earth, Our Island Home" available to all Episcopalians.

#### **EXPLANATION**

We acknowledge the important economic contribution many people have made by working in the fossil fuel industry, while we also recognize that there is an important shift toward renewable energy which will protect God's good creation. Supporting this shift is part of the Church's call to being part of the Jesus Movement in the world and; Climate change is recognized as a human made threat to all God's creation, including people, creatures and the entire created order, while particularly placing unjust and inequitable burdens and stresses on Native Peoples, poor communities and people of color.

"From that time Jesus began to preach, saying, 'Receive the new mind appropriate to this moment, for the Beloved Community is at hand." Matthew 4:17 with

"Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your minds," Romans 12:2

Ethicist Larry Rasmussen has said that the most difficult transformation that humanity has ever faced is the shift from an industrial culture, based on extractive practices and objectification, to a sustainable, integrated life. Christians, since the earliest days of our faith have recognized the value, even the necessity of spiritual practice in order to receive the new life God desires for us.

The Episcopal Diocese of California has been at work in developing a web-based carbon tracking tool that has been designed to allow individual Episcopalians to make healthy life choices that support a sustainable life. The stakes for successfully accomplishing this work are particularly high for Native Peoples, members of subsistence cultures, and communities of the poor. Like popular applications that help people track what they eat and their exercise, this web-based carbon tracking tool will help Episcopalians live into their commitments to sustainability.

Called "Sustaining Earth, Our Island Home," the new web-based carbon tracking tool can be previewed at www.diocal.org/climate One feature of this web-based tool it allows Episcopalians to support each other's commitments. With this tool one can track not only how he or she is living into sustainable life commitments, but also to see how the congregation, Episcopal institution, diocese, and the whole Episcopal Church is moving forward towards transformation. Another feature of "Sustaining Earth, Our Island Home" is that it will be available across the Church – both the United States and in the countries and territories of the Episcopal Church outside the United States.

"Sustaining Earth, Our Island Home" will be fully functional in the Spring of 2019. Data about local energy costs, for instance, is being loaded for the diverse geographic and political areas of the Episcopal Church. Such background data will make "Sustaining Earth, Our Island Home" more user-friendly, as compared with needing to look this up oneself. The initial cost of development and adaptation, up to the Spring 2019 launch is being borne by the Diocese of California, several parishes of the diocese, and by individual Episcopalians within and outside the diocese. The requested \$30,000 for the triennium 2019-2021 will ensure that the background data will be kept fresh and up-to-date, and will provide "Sustaining Earth, Our Island Home" without cost to users.

D053 Stewardship of Creation with Church-Owned Land

Resolved, the House of Deputies concurring, That the 79th General Convention recommends that all dioceses, faith communities and institutions create partnerships enabling the use of church-owned land for regenerative agriculture and biodiversity conservation projects in order to sequester carbon and to mitigate climate change; and be it further

Resolved, That the General Convention direct the Executive Council to appoint a body to gather information from the Church Pension Group, dioceses and other sources in order to create an inventory of all church-owned properties; and be it further

Resolved, the House of \_\_\_\_\_ concurring, That the 79th General Convention affirm the vital witness of the Church to the effects of human-caused climate change as part of our witness as modern Christians and our concern for all who come after us, as we enact our Baptismal Covenant to "persevere in resisting evil" and "strive for justice and peace among all people," and that the energy-inefficiency of our houses of worship undermine our ability to provide this witness; and be it further

Resolved, That the 79th General Convention recognize that the energy inefficiency of aging physical plants and the financial realities of parish budgets make it difficult for parishes to afford energy audits and to update their buildings to renewable and efficiency; and be it further

Resolved, That the 79th General Convention direct the Presiding Bishop's office, with the input of the Episcopal Church Building Fund, to establish a mechanism to support the greening of Episcopal churches through low-interest loans or grants and that \$500,000 be allocated to meet these goals in the 2019-2021 triennium, and that the Presiding Bishop's Office present a status report to the 80th General Convention. Resolved, the House of Deputies concurring, That the 79th General Convention recognize that there is an important shift toward renewable energy which will help protect God's good creation. Resolved, That climate change be recognized as a human-made threat to all God's people, creatures and the entire created order, while particularly placing unjust and inequitable burdens and stresses on native peoples, those displaced by environmental change, poor communities and people of color; and be it further

Resolved, That the 79th General Convention adopt the House of Bishops' 2011 Pastoral Teaching on the Environment\* commitment as the official position of the church; and be it further Resolved, That through our ongoing role as observers at the United Nations, we will continue to fully and completely "advocate for a fair, ambitious, and binding climate treaty," and participate in future meetings of the Conference of Parties to the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change as an active, faithful and engaged voice for all of God's good earth; and be it further

Resolved, That as individuals and communities of faith, The Episcopal Church set an example, in the spirit of the Paris Climate Accord, by making intentional decisions about living lightly and

gently on God's good earth, for example, through energy conservation, renewable energy, sustainable food practices and gardening; and be it further

#### **EXPLANATION**

Resolutions B004, A044, A228, and A043 of the 79th General Convention of the Episcopal Church stress and encourage the continued ministry of Racial Reconciliation and encourage The Episcopal Church, its dioceses, congregations, task forces, commissions, committees and individuals to continue this work.

B004 Encouraging the Language of Dismantling Racism and Racial Healing, Justice, and Reconciliation

Resolved, the House of Deputies concurring, That this 79th General Convention affirms that we condemn racism in all its forms, institutional, systemic, and personal, and we encourage all task forces, commissions, committees, parishes, centers and individuals in The Episcopal Church involved in the work of dismantling racism and seeking to foster racial healing, justice, and reconciliation to expand the language used to designate or describe that work; and be it further

Resolved, there continues to be important work needed to confront institutional and systemic racism in many settings and communities before there can be further work in healing, justice and reconciliation, and be it further

Resolved, there is also important work being done to begin such healing, justice, and reconciliation, and be it further

Resolved, we recognize and affirm that the language around such work is critical to our ability to communicate our purposes with others engaging in this work within the Church and across other organizations, therefore be it further

Resolved, That the terms to be utilized to describe such work should include Dismantling Racisma nd Racial Healing, Justice and Reconciliation.

A044 Establishing an Anti-Racism/Racial Reconciliation Certification Framework: Building Capacity for Becoming Beloved Community

Resolved, the House of Deputies concurring, that the 79th General Convention recognizes that widely different criteria have been used across the Church to determine if the completion of anti-racism training required in Title III and resolution 2000-B049 has been satisfied; and be it

#### further

Resolved, that The Episcopal Church recognizes that in order to maintain a common theological framework in our commitment to dismantle the sin of racism that these specific components are essential to include in any Episcopal Anti-racism or Racial Reconciliation training:

1) Liturgy, preferably a celebration of Eucharist when possible or other corporate worship, grounding the work in scripture and spiritual formation (Proclaiming the Dream of Beloved Community)

- 2) an Historical Component—including but not limited to (and, as appropriate to the context where the training is offered): The Episcopal Church's role in slavery, its history with segregation and discrimination of people of color, the Doctrine of Discovery, The Episcopal Church's role in taking indigenous children from their families through our participation in the boarding school system, and the Church's responses to racism through the years. (Telling the Truth about the Church and Race)
- 3) an Information or Didactic Component—including, but not limited to: the Baptismal Covenant, power, class, race, racism, internalized racial privilege, internalized racial oppression, implicit racial bias, intercultural awareness and communication, becoming co-conspirators in dismantling racism, and envisioning racial reconciliation. (Repairing the Breach)
- 4) Engagement—including, but not limited to: establishing respectful communication guidelines, discussion, Bible Study, and other activities as indicated to accomplish learning objectives for these components.

  (Practicing the Way of Love); and be it further

Resolved, that the Executive Council Committee on Anti-Racism continue to collect and develop, in collaboration with the staff, Christian Formation professionals, and The Absalom Jones Episcopal Center for Racial Healing, resources and best practices for dismantling racism that can be shared online to aide in the consistent fulfillment of the requirement for anti-racism training for lay and ordained leaders across the Church.

D002 Funding the Work of The Beloved Community

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#### **EXPLANATION**

As stated in the Explanation for Resolution A 029, "The Evangelism Charter for the church was developed by a group of committed Episcopal evangelists gathered by the Local Ministry & Mission Committee of Executive Council. We anticipate that video and curricula will be developed based on its principles that will help Episcopalians learn the practices of evangelism."

## APPENDIX III REPORT OF THE BISHOP'S ADDRESS TEAM TO THE DIOCESE

November 30, 2018

Introductory comment: Following Diocesan Convention in October, Bishop Scanlan asked a group of lay and clergy members of the diocese to reflect on what we heard about the Bishop's vision for the diocese as it was articulated in her convention sermon and address. We, the members of the Bishop's Address Team, commend, therefore, our reflections on her vision to you, for your own reflection and action.

#### The Bishop's vision illuminates the possibilities for the future

The Bishop's vision for the diocese is that "we will, through a process of discernment, experimentation, creativity

and collaboration, come to a renewed sense of God's call to us", that we can be "the Body of Christ, working for

and worshipping God, in a way that is vibrant and right-shaped for us."

#### Comments:

- The Holy Spirit's call: The Spirit's call to us doesn't always make us comfortable. The Spirit's enlightening and empowering work often calls us to new ways of understanding old truths.
- Vision for the future: A vision for the future should arise within the heart and soul of the Body of
  Christ, from each and every member of that Body. The vision we harbor might lack specificity, but that
  is intentional; our diocese is unique and is different from other dioceses. This vision will be suited to
  the circumstances of our time, not times past or times that lie far in the future.

#### How will we manage to move into the future?

Discovery, Experimentation, Creativity and Collaboration.

These four tools can allow God's renewed call to us can emerge within us.

#### Comments:

- Tools for this process: These four tools: Discovery, Experimentation, Creativity and Collaboration, offer antidotes to a mindset of scarcity.
- Abundance –or-scarcity?: Scarcity is the flipside of abundance, and there is ample evidence that the people of God in Central Pennsylvania can rejoice in the abundance of God's blessings. But the Parable of the Rich Fool (Luke 12: 13 21) shows the folly of a misplaced focus, of living a lie defined by what you have, not who you are in a life with God. Grain in the barn can last only so long, perhaps a season or two. We are called by the Lord to live out the Gospel not in an environment of scarcity, but abundance, not in an environment of despair, but hope, not in an environment that proclaims "every person for herself or himself", but in an environment in which, as we collaborate with the Spirit and with one another, we experience the Kingdom of God and proclaim the Good News of Jesus Christ.
- Experimenting: As the Lord leads us and as the Holy Spirit enlightens us, we can experiment with generosity, and we can experiment with creative possibilities, developing an attitude that sits lightly with failure, seeing failure as a form of discerning a renewed sense of God's call.
- Starting again: So we start again, start small, start praying, expecting and experimenting with a shared experiences.

#### Jesus' way is the Way of Love

Turn, Learn, Pray, Worship, Bless, Go, Rest. These are the Lord's practices.

#### Comments:

Aligning ourselves with the Way of Love: When we turn to the Way – the Way of Love, Jesus' way, we align ourselves with what really matters, and everything else – abundance and scarcity, joy and fear, endowments and leaking roofs – all of that falls into place.

What next, then?

Discerning God's actions and God's will empowers us to encounter what surprises God has in store for us. We come, fully expectant and open to discovering what surprises God has in store. United by Jesus' practices of the Way of Love, we can be built up into a united people, formed into His image and gifted with a common voice and a common witness to the Good News of God in Christ, as God's call to us is worked out in the contexts of our own communities, parishes and convocations.

Onward! God's Kingdom is in our midst. God's call is ever new. Let us simply shine God's light upon it and celebrate the love, the grace, the healing and the restorative power it offers.





### **REPORTS TO CONVENTION**

### 2017 REPORT OF THE ARCHIVIST

The files of the diocesan archives were utilized to a great extent this year. Many researchers discovered that the archives hold a comprehensive and noteworthy collection of materials that are easily accessible. Archival projects varied tremendously and uncovered many interesting facts about our diocesan history.

On November 4, 2017, a dedicated walking group gathered together to carry a very special Veil from Trinity Episcopal Church, Shamokin, to its new home at St. Stephen's Episcopal Church in Mt. Carmel. The Veil was a key piece of Trinity's rich history. In 1977, a vision of Christ's face was seen on the Veil and, consequently, thousands of people from around the world visited Trinity Church to pray and to meditate before the Veil. Through the leadership of The Rev. Cn. Dan Morrow, Diocesan Canon for Congregational Life & Mission, a service was conducted in St. Mary's Chapel at Trinity Church followed immediately by a seven mile walking journey to Mt. Carmel. During the walk, the Veil was carried by various members of the group and occasional stops were made for prayer and reflection. The Veil arrived safely at its destination and will be devotedly cared for by the parishioners of Mt. Carmel. The story of the Veil will continue to be a cherished part of our diocesan history.

In the spring of 2018, several members of the Questers, Falling Spring Chapter of Fayetteville, Pennsylvania, conducted an investigation into the history of a small white cross that stood in the churchyard of historic Emmanuel Chapel in Mt. Alto. The original intent of the researchers was to restore the damaged cross to its original condition. During the removal of the damaged cross, a small amount of human remains and a brass plaque were discovered. A search was conducted into the history of the plaque, inscribed: T. Edgar Boy, and into the circumstances surrounding his burial in the churchyard. This investigation produced a surprising amount of historical material about the Chapel in Mt. Alto. On May 25, 2018, a service to celebrate the restoration of the cross was held at the Chapel. After the service in the Chapel, a moment of silence and remembrance was offered around the new cross in the churchyard. The Quester's research brought a lost moment of history to life and uncovered the moving story of a now silent family of worshippers at the small chapel in Mt. Alto.

A project to document diocesan programs that related to the issue of eliminating racism was conducted in the spring of 2018. The archives and diocesan journals were searched from 1983 to the present to gather precise information about diocesan actions to address the evils of racism. The research resulted in the preparation of a timeline that included data about diocesan seminars, commissions and projects that were previously offered throughout the diocese. The investigation into this issue is ongoing and will continue to uncover historical and vital information that will aid the diocese in establishing new programs to eliminate racism.

Many genealogy requests were made to the diocesan archives during the past year. One genealogy request resulted in a road trip to Christ Church in York Springs. The genealogy research concerned a parishioner who was buried in the original church cemetery which was located in a wooded plot along White Church Road, York Springs (Christ Church moved from this spot to an area closer to town in the late 1800's). The plot on White Church Road which contained the original church cemetery and is presently maintained under the direction of The Rev. Herb Sprouse, Rector of The Memorial Church of the Prince in Gettysburg. As a result of this genealogy research, the diocesan archives collected historical information and current photographs that were added to the Christ Church archive files.

The past year also included participation in an all-day seminar presented by the Pennsylvania State Archives. The seminar focused on the topic of archival disaster planning. Preplanning and cleanup after a disaster were discussed as well as the issue of archival restoration of damaged artifacts and files. Several helpful contacts were established to assist the diocese in the aftermath of a disaster situation. A disaster plan document for the archives is currently being created.

### Congregational Life and Mission Annual Report

It's hard to believe that this is my third diocesan convention in the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania. I can't begin to explain what a joy it has been to learn from you, to walk alongside you in mission, and seek God's guidance with you as we seek to meet the challenges and embrace the opportunities of serving God's church. As I pondered this report, I began to think of all of the churches I've been blessed to visit during my time here. In a little over two years I've had the opportunity to visit almost all of the churches in the diocese. Your resilience, your strength, your hope and your love continue to amaze and inspire me. Among the highlights of this ministry, are the opportunities to work alongside clergy and laity in times of transition, in times of conflict, and in learning environments.

As I think of these opportunities, I give thanks for the hardworking, committed and Spirit-filled leadership that we enjoy here in DCPA. You all know this, but we are blessed with a multitude of srong and faithful clergy and laity. Some of the situations that I step into are fraught with conflict. Not because of sickness or ill-will. But rather, commitment always leads to conflict. It's normal, and without it we cannot grow and lean into the vision that God has for us. Again, I'm continually amazed at the strength and commitment ofthose who serve this Christ in this diocese. In the face of changing times and diminishing resources, your creativity and authenticity to Christ's call are signs of God's blessing on the church. Thank you.

As I mentioned above, this has been a busy year in terms of transition ministry. At some point this year, 18 congregations have been in some stage of transition. It's both a joy and good-old hard work walking alongside these churches as they search for new clergy leadership. I've revamped the clergy calling process, developing a new set of resources and guidance materal for vestries and search committees. I've attended two transition ministry conferences recruiting (successfully!) new clergy for our churches and I've updated the process of posting positions a national database and the Epsicopal News Service website. It's always a joy to attend the Celebration of New Ministry service after a new Recotr has joined a congregation in mission. As I imaine the crowd at convention, I'm thinking of, and praying for, the new clergy in our midst.

At other times, it's been my privilege to walk alongside congregations in conflict; offering rexources, guidance and a listening ear to those who are struggling with our call to common life. While this work is often trying, it is also very fulfilling as we venture forward together in faith and with renewed commitment to clear, kind, and forthright conversations. In several places, processes are in place to see that mission isn't hindered by unnecessary or unhelpful conflict.

In terms of congregational development, this year several people joind be at the college for congregational development. We learned tools and models that lead to greater choice in communitylife and a clear focu on God's purpose for the church. In addition, we held several Academy for Missional Fromation training days focused on *Sources of Transformation*. Speaking of transofrmatin, I redisgned the Mutal Ministry Reviwe process. We've moved asay from the model of performance review and towards a model that focuses on what God is doing among us. By looking to the reliable ways that God transforms us as disciples, we take the focus of us or our duty, and we look with joy towards what God is doing. According to my calendar, 16 parishes completed this process, which includes an all-encompassing review of congregational life.

Recently ,the bishop and I have been thinking outside of the box, with the "Bisohp of of the Box" initiative. Our plan is to visit each region of the diocese and get out of the church and into the community, sharing God's love and peace in creative ways. Please join us.

As you'll see in my other report, I've journeyed this year with St. Gabriel's in Coles Creek as they made the wrenching, but raithful, decision to close the church. I've worked closedly with our intrepid chancellor, Chuch Banks, during the process. His countless hours of help, advice and legal counsel have proved immesaruably helpful. Thank you Church. During conventin, you will be asked to affirm the decision of Cole's Creek and I urge your affirmation.

In just these last few months, we've welcomed Shannon Pedersen to our diocesan staff. Shannon is serving as both the Coordinator for Diocesan Event and as my assistant. Shannon has proved to be ahard wrker and valuable addition to our diocesan ministry. Thank you for your hard work.

Finally, it is a joy and privilege to work with and for such an inspiring and Spirit-filled bishop. I came her to PA because I believed in her vision for God's mission. We are blessed to serve with her. In addition, the diocesan staff is top notceh. Eachand every day I give thanks for my colleagues and their faithrul service to God and you.

### From Our Director

As Pennsylvanians age, their numbers are increasing as are services that help keep them in their own homes or apartments. Nevertheless, there are aging persons with five or more chronic conditions, over the age of 85, who struggle with living independently and safely. Personal care continues to be a viable, and perhaps the only, chance for some of our aging citizens to survive. Affordability is an issue for those who have outlived most of their financial resources. This is why benevolent care is so important, and why our residents depend on the generosity of our diocesan family to help subsidize their care. Pennsylvania is one of only two states not working with Medicare for payment of Personal Care Services.

With your financial contributions, you, as members of the Diocese, are providing a much-needed service unmet by state government – service to a very vulnerable population.

### **Episcopal Home Facility**

EMG conducted a property audit which resulted in an 86-page Physical Needs Assessment. Proposed physical needs for over a 20-year period is \$2.1 million for maintenance, which averages \$105,000.00 per year. This is not for new construction, but rather physical needs updating.




### A Much-Needed Project

We have flooring that has been in place since 1959. It covers 16 resident rooms, a main hallway, the hair salon, and a sitting area. Our Board of Trustees voted to have new flooring installed – a long overdue project that will benefit our residents and staff, and appeal to prospective residents.

### **Our Mission Statement**

The Episcopal Home is a place where residents receive friendship, spiritual nurture, rest, recreation and excellent physical care in a peaceful setting which allows them to live in a place of safety, warmth, and love. The Home is able to care for those with limited financial means, because parishes of the Episcopal Diocese of Central Pennsylvania support the facility. Through the ministry of the Episcopal Home, the Church is engaged in God's mission to value life and care for others.

### **Marketing & Visibility**

Our marketing firm, Global HMA, was hired to increase the Home's visibility within our Diocese and in the lower Cumberland Valley. As a mission of the Episcopal Diocese of Central Pennsylvania, the Episcopal Home depends on members of diocesan parishes for financial support. Recently, in conjunction with Episcopal Home Mission Sunday, parishioners were invited to write a message on a postcard and send it to our Episcopal Home residents. We have received over 300 postcards from all over the diocese. Responses are heartwarming and range from personal messages, scripture, inspirational quotes, and even drawings from children.

### Finances/Audit



At the last board meeting, Deb Kelly, of Greenawalt and Company, attended to review the 2017 audit. No material modifications should be made to the EH accounting statements. The revenues for the year were \$837,814.00, with expenses of \$1,087,900.00. The \$250,086.00 reduction in net assets was offset by the earnings by investments held at State Street Global. The end result was a reduction in assets of \$51,275.



Mission: To live by Christ's example in the world by witnessing and articulating the needs of the parish and community. We are called to address food insecurity and its causes in the communities that surround us. We accept the challenge to respond to the needs of mind, body and spirit while serving those marginalized by hunger.

**Feed My Sheep** (FMS) collaborates with parishes and their communities, The Central PA Food Bank, The Gleaning Project, Canstruction, & Central PA organizations.



Recent Update: Parishes throughout our diocese continued with great efforts in 2017 –2018 to provide for those in need, especially those who are hungry. Community meal programs have expanded, such as Trinity in Chambersburg, Franklin County, who now is providing a Sunday lunch as well as a Thursday breakfast. The Lancaster county network, an ecumenical ministry, is feeding the hungry

through a number of initiatives. One committee called, ALERT, trouble shoots for the current hunger needs in the community and matches that need in Lancaster to those who can facilitate relief and problem solve. Last week in conversation with Arch Deacon Jane Miron FMS became aware of a need for baby food and formula. ALERT is working on solutions for this shortage and FMS will be supporting the parish who is ministering to this need.



- FMS has been connecting parishes and individuals to head out for gleaning again this summer and fall. Harvest days have been a challenge because of the rain but gleaning has been abundant!

### No One Should Be Hungry Appreciation Day

Attending this Year's Central Pennsylvania Food Bank's 2018 Agency Appreciation Conference was inspiring and educational. I was able to speak with several of the vendors and gain knowledge and information on where to send individuals who may need assistance, for a variety of reasons, to help feed their families.

I particularly enjoyed one of the workshops I attended called "Food is more than Medicine."

Our speaker for this workshop was Amanda Frankeny. This workshop was of particular interest to me because of an Adult Special Needs Ministry at my church called "Hilltoppers." We meet twice a month from September-May and once a month during the summer months. On program nights, we have dinner together or a snack. We certainly want to provide wholesome and healthy snacks for the individuals attending our program. And, more than that, we want our participants to play an active role in deciding what they would like to eat. This is where the "Food is more than Medi-

cine" workshop helped me.

The very first slide that was presented during the workshop helped me realize that making healthy choices for our program this year can be educational, fun and nutritional. Food is more than fuel for the body. Food is about



the family or community you share it with. Food is also about identity and where we come from. Sharing food and recipes help us know one another better. We can provide a healthy perspective and nourish our bodies and relationships by eating well.

Eating well? What does that mean? Hunger and poor nutrition can lead to health problems. This workshop named six principles of healthy living that may just "add years to lives and life to years."

- Consuming minimally-processed, mostly plant-based foods
- Adopting a physically active lifestyle
- Avoiding toxins such as tobacco and excess alcohol
- Getting plenty of sleep
- Reducing psychological stress
- Cultivating supportive relationships and social bonds



No one in this country should be hungry. The

Central Pennsylvania Food Bank and many organizations who have teamed up with them are finding ways to reach out to those in need, to provide food and sometimes medical assistance. I was impressed to find out that health care providers are teaming up with local food pantries to offer health screening for individuals if they choose to have it when picking up their food. Our speaker pointed out that by having a health care team visit on the day of food pick up may provide an opportunity


**for health screening** and possibly proactive treatment for an individual if needed.

### Safe Guarding God's Children Training Report

**Mission Statement:** Safe Guarding God's Children training and curriculum prepares parishes to prevent sexual misconduct toward children within the context of the Episcopal Church. The Goal is to reach every person with this training within the diocese and congregation, pre-schools and child care and youth entities that have a home in our parishes and relate to children; including those who are employed or works with and ministers to and with children and youth. This training has as its outcome:

- 1. A review of the PA laws
- 2. A focus on developing safe space
- 3. A commitment to keeping our promise to each child, each family we serve while deepening our understanding of the importance of use of power, setting clear boundaries and holding ourselves accountable to one another.

Deacon Brenda Taylor continues with excellence to administrate the Safeguarding God's Children and People on line modules.

### **Outcomes for 2018**

- 1. Updated clearances for all clergy and lay employees of the Diocese of Central PA.
- 2. Two Training Trainers Event(s) continue to establish trainers in every convocation and eventually every parish 4 new trainers.
- 3. Re-write and update of Diocese of Central PA Policy and Procedural Manual that demonstrates zero tolerance and includes SGC and SGP.
- Encourage convocational and parish training. Copies of the child abuse clearances required of the participants and copies of their certificates of completion are maintained by the individual parishes.

### The training process as offered now includes:

- 1. Collaborative community building around issues of children and youth ministry.
- 2. Outreach to smaller parishes and facilitation of collaborative training opportunities with other congregations.
- 3. Creation of ongoing communication through the web.
- 4. Developing an increased community awareness and collective commitment to protect the children of the diocese with zero tolerance.

### Annual Report of Standing Committee 2018

For the Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Central Pennsylvania, the Rt Rev. Audrey Scanlan, Bishop

In actions this year, the Standing Committee

- Affirmed candidacy and ordination of 7 people brought forward in the ordination process
- Affirmed 4 bishops-elect
- Appointed the interim diocesan treasurer
- Appointed a co-convener for Southern Convocation
- Appointed a member of the apostolate to fill a vacancy on Standing Committee
- Sent to the 2018 Diocesan Convention a resolution to research gender equality in the search and hiring of priests and rectors in our diocese

The Standing Committee organized itself this year to intentionally cover the 4 areas of responsibility canonically given to it—matters in The Episcopal Church, primarily affirmation or refusal of affirmation for bishops-elect; the Ordination Process; Diocesan Property, and Counsel to the bishop. This clarity of organization is seen in the Standing Committee's current monthly agenda, and also in the appointed representatives from Standing Committee to the Commission on Ministry and Finance Committee, detailed below.

In a new practice meant to keep pace with our Bishop's vision for this diocese, Standing Committee has completed its third year of study to develop a leadership sense of missional focus on the changing church. Each year for the last 3 years, SC has studied a book together. This year, the committee studied <a href="Participating in God's Mission">Participating in God's Mission</a>, a Theological Missiology for the Church in America, by Craig van Gelder and Dwight Zschelle. Meetings now include 20 minutes of leader development spent in discussion of missional formation in congregations and levels of a church's judicatory.

The main work done by Standing Committee this year has focused on recognizing the appropriate boundaries of SC responsibilities

- In the ordination process
- · In affirmation of bishops-elect
- In approval of requests to encumber church property
- In support of Bishop Scanlan's initiatives for the health and growth of the diocese

Our most significant work clarified Standing Committee's role and responsibilities in the ordination process. The Committee engaged in an intensive study of what is appropriate, necessary and good, and what work is NOT appropriate to Standing Committee when engaging in the ordination process . A methodical overview of every step in the ordination process required by canons and as practiced currently in the Diocese, accounting for all responsibilities, all exchanges of required information and all documentation, is now on record for all three diocesan entities involved: the Standing Committee, the Bishop and her office, and the Commission on Ministry.

The fruitfulness of this work so far is a new level of relationship between Standing Committee and the Commission on Ministry. The two groups now exchange questions asked of postulants, candidates and ordinands. In addition, the SC representatives who attend COM meetings, report on people in the process before they come to SC for interviews, acquainting SC members with people in the process, and giving insights into the gradual formation of each, so that no person comes to an ordination interview cold and without background. In the coming months, COM and SC will have a retreat together, the aim of which includes deepening the understanding and trust between both groups, and effecting an improved rhythm of work in the process overall. Standing Committee is particularly concerned with the need in this diocese for clergy with an appropriate focus on the changes in the church and our emerging diocesan missional identity.

Articulating the actual canonical responsibilities and role of Standing Committee over the past 3 years has, this year, resulted in Standing Committee adding tasks of representation to its work. A representative attends Finance Committee meetings, another 2 representatives rotate attendance at all COM meetings, and a member of Standing Committee studies and reports on the progress of all TEC bishop resignations, diocesan Search Committees, and candidates prior to electing conventions. The SC representatives attend Finance and COM meetings with voice but not vote. They report to SC at their next meetings, so

that SC members will be fully informed and prepared when matters, or in the case of the COM, postulants and candidates come to them for affirmation. Besides this, 2 members of Standing Committee are charged with preparing and conducting the time in the meetings devoted to the ordination interviews themselves.

Through trial and revision this year, Standing Committee has been reaching for an effective interview process for postulants, candidates and ordinands, one that makes for considered inquiry, still leaving time in each meeting for prayer, silence, and timely address of regular Standing Committee business. This year, Standing Committee changed from meeting 6 times a year, to meeting 11 times a year, the better to accommodate the actual progress of postulants, candidates and ordinands, and to give the Bishop the flexibility she needs for ordaining those who have reached that point in the process. Standing Committee now meets on the 1st Tuesday of every month but August, in the Diocesan House, starting at 1 p.m., lasting 2-3 hours.

### 2018 Annual Report Commission on Ministry The Diocese of Central Pennsylvania

The Commission on Ministry serves to provide advice and counsel to the Bishop on all matters pertaining to the ordination process. The Commission also assists the Bishop in the formation of those members of our diocese who are called to both lay and ordained ministries. The membership of the Commission currently includes four Priests, one Deacon, the Archdeacon for Deacons, and six lay persons.

The Commission meetings are held monthly. The Commission also conducts a winter retreat in which all Postulants and Candidates participate. The Co-Vice-Chairs of the Commission meet with the Bishop on a regular basis. Members of the Commission are appointed to serve as "companions" for Postulants and Candidates as they make their way through the ordination process.

The Commission is continuing to develop a closer working relationship with the Stevenson School for Ministry and with the Standing Committee. In the year ahead the Commission will be working with the SSFM to more effectively address the formation of lay ministers.

Through "Little Dresses for Africa" we will be assisting with this hygiene matter by sewing and supplying Sani-Panties which at distribution starts discussion with the girls about good hygiene. This continues to be an on-going project that continued during our women's retreat this month.

Cindy Mohr headed the delegation for Triennial 2018 in Austin, Texas. Alyce Peiffer, UTO Coordinator, Eileen Sullivan and Shirley Wagner, were the other three delegates. Shirley Wagner received the Distinguished Woman Award for the Dioceses of Central Pennsylvania. Cindy Mohr will be serving as the Province III representative on the ECW National Board for the 2018-2021 Triennium. Keynote speaker Steven Charleston, retired Bishop of Alaska, was an inspiration to all and continues to be as many of us read his postings and books. Other speakers included Canon Stephanie Spellers, Canon for Evangelism, Reconciliation and Creation and Yewande Austin, social impact leader, cultural leader and activist who empowers vulnerable youth through her humanitarian organization. We were inspired by the work at Community First! Village, a ministry of Mobile Loaves and Fishes in Austin. The Diocesan ECW Board was able to supply a donation to this united gift. We also made a donation to the Trinity Shower Ministry at St. David's Episcopal Church. There they supply a private and secure shower program for homeless woman. We also made donations of hygiene supplies. We amended Bylaws, passed resolutions and elected officers to serve for the next 3 years.

It is hard to explain the feeling community at Triennial and Convention. A feeling that you know everyone in the room but yet have never met before. What was there that stood out? There was Presiding Bishop Curry's homilies, daily Eucharist, the Texas Night Revival, the sermons, the great diverse music, making bags of food and toiletries for distribution to the homeless, the hospitality of the people of Austin, the bats, and the walking.

This year the annual ECW retreat, "Three Mystics, Three Objects, Three Practices", was held September 14 through 16, 2018 at the Claggett Center in Maryland. Due to an unfortunate accident with nature, Rev. Barbara Hutchinson was unable to lead the retreat as planned. The Rev. Cannon Kate Harrigan came to the rescue! It was a great weekend of fellowship and learning. Friday evening opened with an exercise on gratitude followed by a session on the writings in the "Medicine Wheel" by Steven Charleston. Saturday sessions were on the three mystics, three objects and three practices. Saturday evening was spent making journals. Sunday retreat goers were asked to read a passage from the "Medicine Wheel" that spoke to them. Eucharist followed. From the weekend, we have interest from in assistance with starting a Facebook page as well as starting some ECW social activities.

Our Lord Jesus Christ wills the unity of his Church. On the night of his Last Supper, our Lord prayed: that they may all be one, Father! May they be in us, just as you are in me and I am in you. May they be one, so that the world may believe that you sent me. I gave them the same glory you gave me, so that they may be one, just as you and I are one; I in them and you in me, so that they may be completely one, in order that the world may know that you sent me and that you love them as you love me. (John 17:21-23) Together all Christians are to make every effort to preserve the unity which has the Spirit as its origin and peace as its binding force because: there is but one Body and one Spirit...just as there is one Lord, one faith, one Baptism; one God and Father of all, who is over all, and works through all, and is in all. (Ephesians 4:4-6)

We affirm that the Holy Spirit bestows unity and opens us to new possibilities to provide an effective expression of God's love in Christ. The same Spirit call us to accept the convergences already achieved among us and work toward the goal of unity willed by Christ, while acknowledging and respecting the doctrinal differences among us.

Impelled by the Spirit, the bishops of our three traditions have convened annual days of dialogue among our clergy and laity and have encouraged our parishes to work together in the cause of Christian unity. Indeed. a long history of cooperation exists among us.

We believe that the same Spirit calls us now to enter into this formal covenant as a sign of our increased commitment to the unity of the whole Christian Church. This covenant is a witness to the one Spirit who will lead all Christians to the fulfillment of Our Lord's high priestly prayer and is not a declaration of an exclusive relationship among our three traditions.

### **THEREFORE**

relying on the faithful love of the Triune God, we commit ourselves to celebrate the unity already achieved through years of Lutheran-Anglican-Roman Catholic conversations and to strengthen the visible unity of the Body of Christ in Central Pennsylvania.

We hereby call into covenant our respective Synods and Dioceses, committing ourselves to leading the Church to greater unity and by urging our clergy and parishes to

- Pray for each other and the unity of the Church, particularly at the Sunday Liturgy
- Sponsor seasonal prayer services, especially during the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity
- Engage in shared Lectionary studies
- Promote pulpit exchanges in non-Eucharistic liturgies and extend other invitations in accord with respective guidelines of each tradition
- Cooperate in the provision of pre-marital preparation for marriages in accordance with the <u>Guidelines for Mixed Marriage celebration and preparation between Episcopalians, Lutherans, and Roman Catholics in Central Pennsylvania issued in1987</u>
- Promote covenants among congregations, institutions, and chaplaincies
- Study the traditions of our churches, emphasizing the common witness increasingly made possible as the result of our theological dialogues
- Sponsor shared retreats and formational events for clergy and parish leadership

- Collaborate at both the local and judicatory levels on issues of evangelization, justice, and social concerns
- Work whenever possible to support and facilitate future ecumenical efforts among all Christians To further the goals of this covenant, we will establish a Covenant Committee to lead in actualizing this covenant, annually review it; and annually report to our respective dioceses and synods; and provide for an annual celebration of this covenant with a liturgy of renewal presided over by the bishops. May the Holy Spirit, who has brought us to this moment of covenanting, bring us to ever deepening levels of unity. To this end we affix our names in behalf of our respective judicatories on this twenty third day of May in the year of Our Lord, Nineteen Hundred Ninety Three. Re-signed on this twenty second day of October in the year of Our Lord, Two Thousand Seventeen.

Lutheran, Anglican and Roman Catholic (LARC) Day of Dialogue was held on Monday, October 23 from 9:000 a.m. – 3:00 p.m. at the Diocese of Harrisburg Administrative Center, just east of Harrisburg. Every autumn, local clergy and faithful of the Lutheran, Anglican and Roman Catholic communities gather at the Cardinal Keeler Center in Harrisburg for the annual LARC Day of Dialogue, hosted by the <u>Diocesan Office of Ecumenical and Interreligious Affairs</u>. The daylong conference is open to all people, and is one of a number of programs and activities hosted by the office.

In 1993, and again in 2017, the bishops of the Episcopal Diocese of Central Pennsylvania, the Roman Catholic Diocese of Harrisburg, the Lower Susquehanna Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, and the Upper Susquehanna Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America signed the LARC Covenant as a means of providing occasions of joint prayer and greater cooperation between the Churches.

### LARC Vespers - 2017

The LARC Vespers were held on Sunday, October 22 at the United Lutheran Seminary in Gettysburg and was attended by the current bishops of the LARC Covenant. At this service all four Bishops re-signed the LARC Covenant. This service was held in commemoration of the 500<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the Reformation and a celebration of the many steps Lutherans, Anglicans, and Roman Catholics have taken toward unity of a broken church. All are Welcome!

### LARC Day of Dialogue - 2018

The next LARC Day of Dialogue is scheduled for Monday, November 5 from 9:00 a.m. – 3:00 p.m. at the Diocese of Harrisburg, Administrative Center. The topic this year is "Christians Response to Violence." We will focus on gun violence, the violence of racism, and the response to violence that flows from the peace churches. This Day of Dialogue is open to all. Registration can be found at <a href="https://www.hbgdiocese.org/larc">www.hbgdiocese.org/larc</a> The cost is \$30 for a single registration or \$50.00 for two registrations from the same parish. Please join us in prayer and learning.

### **PA Council of Churches**

Attended a PA Council of Churches meeting on Tuesday, October 17, Tuesday, April 10, and Tuesday, October 16 at the United Church Center. They continue to sponsor workshops and seminars on a variety of topics. We are hoping to add this schedule to our website by the end of 2018 so the information can be

more widely disseminated. Advocacy on a number of issues: peace, justice, refugees, fair wages, etc. are at the forefront of what they do.

### **Other Activities**

I attended the 2018 Commonwealth Interfaith Service held at the Beth El Temple in Harrisburg.

### **OPERATION UNDERSTANDING: 2018 ANNUAL REPORT**

Operation Understanding is a diocesan commitment to provide grant funding for parishes to start new outreach ministries, as well as to help existing ministries extend their programs by providing food, shelter, clothing, health care, energy assistance, and youth or health education. Priority is given to grant requests directed toward starting new ministries. Prior to September 2018, Operation Understanding awarded two grants to parishes. St. Luke's Episcopal Church (Altoona) received \$750 to fund restoring the parish's community garden, greenhouse maintenance and youth education activities. St. Luke's Episcopal Church (Mt. Joy) received \$1,200 to kick-off a new social justice education program for its community. Related expenses included a CVLI license, printed materials, marketing/ promotions and multi-media tools. By inserting articles in the 'Diocesan Digest' twice during the year, the committee tried to make parishes and readers aware of grant funding opportunities. However, only two more grant applications were submitted as a result.

During the fourth quarter 2018, members of the clergy will receive a *special message* from the diocese challenging them to explore ways to tackle situations in their communities where new ministry projects could help people. And then to apply for Operation Understanding grants before the end of the year.

### Report of the Social Justice Network The Rev. Linda Watkins, Coordinator

The Social Justice Network is the new name members choose for the Social Justice Committee to better reflect how we see our work. In 2018, we met via ZOOM 1-2 weeks before each meeting of the Council of Trustees.

We invited guests to many of our meetings to help us clarify opportunities for Social Justice work in our Diocese. Kevin Barron (Anti-Racism Committee), Robyn Szoke (Dean, Stevenson School), Chad Linder (Diocesan Finance Officer), Shannon Berndt (Episcopal Peace Fellowship) were among those we heard from. These conversations resulted in sparking ideas as to how we might network with various Social Justice Ministries.

Working closely with Alexis Guszick, we updated our portion of the Diocesan website as well as our Social Justice Network Face Book page. Please use that to spread the word about Social Justice ministries, events, etc.

Over the past year, our Diocese has begun a new Dismantling Racism initiative. Two parishes have presented programs on Gun Violence. A Convocation is planning on working together on a vigil to honor victims of the Opioid Epidemic.

Although we are not a grant-giving entity per se, we did give a \$250 grant in support of a Prison Ministry workshop which was held in January.

Plans for the future include hosting a Social Justice Ministry Fair sometime next spring. This event will include workshops, speakers, and worship – all pertaining to Social Justice issues. We feel it important to provide and opportunity where those engaged in Social Justice Ministry to meet in person, share ideas, and engage in learning together.

Some of our work for next year will include helping establish Diocesan committees around Stewardship of Creation and Addressing Issues around the Death Penalty. Doing this is part of what we have been asked to do as a Diocese to respond to resolutions passed at this summer's General Convention.

This has been exciting work! The Network will be meeting soon and we'd be delighted to hear from more people about the ministries being done. Please contact Linda Watkins at rector@stmaryswaynesboro.org.

### Refugee Resource Group: 2018 ANNUAL REPORT

The Refugee Resource Group is a diocesan group dedicated to help refugees in our area feel welcomed and supported as our neighbors. This year the committee focused on creating an educational program about how a person becomes a refugee, understanding the challenges a refugee encounters upon arriving here and about how we can help refugees to resettle in the community. The program series will be comprised of three, 45-minute presentations designed to use as a full-day training session or for three consecutive Adult Forums. The program series will be available online for people to view as well.

We began the process of building the educational program by using a decision making model known as the *Six Thinking Hats*. We worked with organizations having had experience working with and resettling refugees. The organizations included Episcopal Migration Ministries, Catholic Charities, Church World Services, All Lancaster Episcopal Response Team and Pa. Immigrant and Refugee Women's Network. Members of the committee traveled to Bucknell University to meet with a professor involved a food donation and delivery system for one of the main refugee shelters in central Athens. She said, "No one hears about the refugee crisis in the eastern Mediterranean anymore here in the news in the west, although the problems are continuing. I suppose there is only so much bad news any population can take in on a daily basis." In May, committee members attended a Penn State Eastgate Lecture Series workshop entitled 'Refugees in the USA and Pennsylvania'.

In the year ahead, we will build upon the program series by providing current information about refugee issues and by offering program speakers to supplement assembly presentations. Also, the Refugee Resource Group's webpage (a dropdown on 'The Jesus Movement' menu) will be updated on a frequent basis. Our churches need to be aware of their refugee neighbors and help them to connect with their communities.

One new course. The Deacon's in Action, was available in the spring semester 2018 to those who are ready for field placement. The spring semester will lead into field placement during the summer semester. We have three students enrolled.

March 3rd: Discovery Day, 4 members of the COM and 3 SSFM faculty and dean gathered with Bishop Scanlan and 11 folks interested in understanding "call". They gathered, bringing their discernment questions and academic standards questions from all those who are considering a call or are inquiring (for lay and ordained vocations).

### Summer of 2018

- 1. Working in collaboration with Lancaster Theological Seminary--The Stevenson School for Ministry will be offering a joint certificate in Anglican Studies with Lancaster Theological Seminary. hopefully beginning fall 2018.
- 2. We have four new students to begin the new summer semester cohort who are starting their vocation discernment and journey through our new two year scope and sequence for the certificate for the ministry of deacon and the new four year scope and sequence for the certificate for the ministry of worker priest:

- 3. We offered four courses, two tutorials, and two discernment courses with a total of 41 students participating in our first summer semester.
- 4. Shawn Strout, our Associate Dean for Academic Affairs spent the summer changing our learning platform from Moodle to Populi. This new learning platform will offer registration, on line courses as well as transcripts all in one place.

Vital and Effective Leadership Institute for newly ordained and new clergy to the diocese

Presently there are 8 participants, with three more joining us in October 2018. This colleague and learning opportunity is offered at no cost to the clergy.

ELCA collaboration John Roberto and Vibrant Faith participation at a lesser registration fee—SSFM presently has two students participating in the lay catechist program.

Summer collaboration included the ELCA choosing SSFM learning platform for its parish life courses. We

began this summer with 15 students taking The Spiritual Practices course.

We held three SSFM Board Meetings, with The Rev. Canon David Lovelace as Chair. We developed and continued to work with a strategic plan that places intentionality upon the need for financial growth as well as formational growth in parish life to live into our three year strategic plan. We are focusing on four teams: Financial, Marketing, Curriculum and Cross Generational. Winter Retreat was held December 1 -3, 2017 at Camp Mount Luther. The theme was "Prepare the Way, Follow the Path to Peace". It was a wonderful retreat and was enjoyed by all. The Rev. Canon Ken Wagner-Pizza joined us for the weekend and led us in renewing our baptismal covenants by the lake at CML. He led us with a beautiful service walking the labyrinth and having prayer under the stars. The Very Rev. Robyn Szoke-Coolidge led us on Sunday for our Closing Eucharist.

January Happening planning meeting was held at Christ Episcopal Church Coudersport. We had twenty-four in attendance. Karen DiPace made all the meals for the weekend. We were so welcomed by everyone at the church. It was a great planning and team-building weekend with the youth. We finalized all the plans for the Happening #11 weekend. We enjoyed Sunday Eucharist with the Rev. Janis Yskamp.

On February 15 – 18, 2018 a group of 53 youth, Young Adults and Adults from our diocese met at Camp Mount Luther for a weekend called Happening. The Happening "Experience" is a powerful instrument of Christian Renewal. During the three-day retreat, the participants listened to talks given by teenagers and adults. The presentation of the talks by youth used personal life experiences to offer Christ's message to attending Happeners on a level they can understand and to answer many of the faith questions youth struggle with on a daily basis. Talks about church teachings and their importance in the lives of youth attending the weekend where given. Each talk is a critical building block in the creation of the Happening message. The entire series of talks is given in a sequence that is intended to guide Happeners by opening an avenue of discussions to help them verbalize and internalize their faith questions in a safe environment, hopefully leading to a new or renewed relationship with Christ. Brooks Morgan served as Rector and Tierza Mendez as Assistant Rector.

The weekend started off very hard with a youth leader and two youth being in a car accident. Two other youth were not able to join us because of the flu. It turned out to be an amazing weekend. The youth learned how powerful prayer can be and shared in many "God Moments".

We had seventeen Young Adults as part of the Celebration Team #1. This is the first year we had a curriculum for the weekend and everyone enjoyed the weekend. They cooked and prepared their own meals over the weekend. They stopped each hour during the weekend and would pray for the Happeners, Happening staff and our youth that could not be with us. We ended the weekend with a wonderful closing Eucharist by our youth rector, Brooks Morgan and The Rev. Regina Bautista. Our Celebration Team also joined us for the service.

On March 17-19, 2018 a group of 32 youth, three young adults and twelve adults met at Camp Mount Luther for a weekend called New Beginnings. New Beginnings is a unique ministry that shares the love of Christ with middle school-aged youth of today. "New Beginnings" speaks, listens, and challenges middle school youth to be positive about themselves, their friends, families and their communities, in a critical time in their lives. This ministry reminds them that we are all children of God, we are special, we are loved, and there is nothing that we cannot overcome with Christ.

Leah Doyle from All Saints Episcopal Church in Coudersport was the Rector for New Beginnings. Our Young Adults and Sr. High Youth led the retreat with assistance from the adults. They gave wonderful talks on self, families, friends, peer pressure and many other topics. We had a great turn out of Jr. high youth and they seemed to enjoy the weekend. They grew spiritually with without realizing it. Many new friendships were formed and old ones reunited. The talent show was lots of fun with some amazing talents. There was a lot of positive energy during the weekend with so many boys in attendance.

August 17 – 19, 2018 we had a great weekend at Camp Small Valley in Halifax with 31 youth and adults. (It changed from North Bay Retreat Center because of cost). It was a fun weekend with swimming, hiking, team building and playing games. We had planning meetings during the weekend with the different aged youth to plan for the retreats that will be happening 2018 – 2019.

I will be attending the Diocesan Youth Leaders Gathering September 24 - 27, 2019 in Kansas City, MO. It is a group of Diocesan youth leaders that connect leaders whose primary responsibility is youth ministry at the diocesan level. There will be sessions on Pastoral Care for Youth workers, research on mountaintop experiences, recruiting, training supporting paid and volunteer parish youth workers, break out sessions to share best practices and struggles plus much more. ### INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

The Incorporated Trustees of the Episcopal Diocese of Central Pennsylvania
Harrisburg, Pennsylvania

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of The Incorporated Trustees of the Episcopal Diocese of Central Pennsylvania (nonprofit organization), which comprise the statement of assets, liabilities and net assets - modified cash basis of as of December 31, 2017 and 2016 and the related statement of support and revenue, expenses and other changes in net assets - modified cash basis for the year then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

### Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with the modified cash basis of accounting described in the notes to the financial statement; this includes determining that the modified cash basis of accounting is an acceptable basis for the preparation of the financial statements in the circumstances. Management is also responsible for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

#### Auditor's Responsibility

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS DECEMBER 31, 2017 AND 2016

#### SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### Nature of activities

The Incorporated Trustees of the Episcopal Diocese of Central Pennsylvania (Diocese) is a constituent of the Episcopal Church, known as the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America. The Diocese exists, operates and is governed pursuant to a Constitution and Canons adopted in 1789 and subsequently amended from time to time. The Diocese is a nonprofit organization and is dedicated to establishing, developing and promoting all aspects of church ministry within the sixty-two parishes of Central Pennsylvania. The Diocese is supported primarily through parish assessments received from each of the parishes.

#### **Basis of accounting**

The accompanying financial statements have been prepared on the modified cash basis of accounting. This basis differs from generally accepted accounting principles primarily because revenues and expenses are recorded when received rather than when earned or incurred, with the exception of investments which are carried at fair market value and the related appreciation or depreciation is recognized in the current period and accounted for as a revenue or expense. Payroll tax withholdings are reported as a liability based on wages paid in the current year. The financial operations of individual parishes distinct from the Diocese are not reflected in the financial statements.

#### Basis of presentation

Financial statement presentation follows the recommendations of the Financial Accounting Standards Board. Organizations are required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets:

#### Unrestricted

Net assets which may be used for any purpose. They are not restricted by donor-imposed stipulations.

#### Temporarily restricted

Amounts received from donors who have imposed restrictions on how the funds are to be utilized or in what time frame they are to be used.

#### Permanently restricted

Net assets whose use is limited by donor-imposed stipulations that neither expire by passage of time nor can be fulfilled or otherwise removed by actions of the organization.

#### Use of estimates

The preparation of financial statements on the modified cash basis of accounting requires the use of estimates based on management's knowledge and experience. Due to their prospective nature, actual results could differ from those estimates.

#### Investments

Investments are stated at fair value. The investments managed by the Episcopal Church Foundation include investments of the Diocese and custodial funds for any of the sixty-two parishes. The funds are pooled to maximize earnings. Investment income or loss (including realized and unrealized gains and losses on investments, interest and dividends) is included in the change in unrestricted net assets unless restricted by donor or law.

The Diocese invests in a professionally-managed portfolio that contains various types of securities. Such investments are exposed to interest rate, market and credit risks. Due to the level of risk associated with such investments, and the level of uncertainty related to changes in the value of such investments, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the near term materially affect investment balances and the amounts reported in the financial statements and the accompanying notes. On the statement of assets, liabilities, and net assets modified cash basis, funds held for others are included in the investment balance.

### Property and equipment

The cost or value of property and equipment are expensed in the year purchased.

#### Mission and parish property

Active missions and parishes of the Diocese are not recorded in the financial statements. The Diocesan has control over the property through the Standing Committee. The congregations maintain beneficial use of the properties. In the event that a mission or parish is deconsecrated, beneficial ownership of the property held by the congregation reverts to the Diocese and is therefore held as an asset of the Diocese until sold. The proceeds from the sale of deconsecrated (consecrated) congregations are recorded as support and revenue on the statement of support and revenue, expenses and other changes in net assets - modified cash basis.

#### Contributions

Support that is restricted by the donor is reported as an increase in unrestricted net assets if the restriction expires in the reporting period in which the support is recognized. All other donor – restricted support is reported as an increase in temporarily or permanently restricted net assets depending on the nature of the restriction. When a restriction expires (that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished), temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets and reported in the statement of support and revenue, expenses and other changes in net assets as net assets released from restrictions.

#### Functional allocation of expenses

The costs of providing the various programs and other activities have been summarized on a functional basis in the statement of support and revenue, expenses and other changes in net assets - modified cash basis.

#### Income taxes

The Diocese is a non-profit organization which is statutorily exempt from federal income taxes under the Internal Revenue Code. The standards require an assessment of the Diocese's exposure to income taxes at the entity level as a result of uncertain tax positions taken in current and previous years. Examples of tax positions taken at the entity level include the continuing validity of its tax exempt status, potential unrelated business activities and other tax positions that could result in income taxes to the Diocese upon examinations by taxing authorities. The Diocese's management is not aware of any activities that would jeopardize its tax-exempt status or would be subject to unrelated business or excise tax.

As a religious organization, the Diocese is not subject to annual income tax filings. However, any activities that are unrelated to their exempt purpose could subject the Diocese to filing a Form 990T. No such filings were made in the prior three years.

#### Subsequent events

In preparing these financial statements, the Diocese has evaluated events and transactions for potential recognition through December 17, 2018, the date which the financial statements were available to be issued.

#### RECENT ACCOUNTING STANDARDS

ASU 2015-07, "Fair Value Measurement (Topic 820): Disclosures for Investments in Certain entities that Calculate Net Asset Value Per Share (or its equivalent)," was adopted for the Diocese's financial statements for the year ending December 31, 2017. This standard removed the requirement to categorize investments within the fair value hierarchy for all for which fair value is measured using the net asset value per share as the practical expedient. There were no changes to net assets as a result of this adoption.

ASU 2017-14, "Not-for-Profit Entities (Topic 958), Presentation of Financial Statements of Not-For-Profit Entities," is effective for the Diocese's financial statements for the year ending December 31, 2018. This amendment aims to improve how a nonprofit organization classifies its net assets and provides information in its financial statements and notes about its financial performance, cash flow, and liquidity. The ASU changes the net asset classifications, requires presentation of expenses both by nature and function, requires investment return reported net of investment expenses, requires place-in-service approach for gifts of/for long-lived assets, and provides enhanced disclosures for: governing body restrictions; composition of net assets with donor restrictions; qualitative and quantitative information on liquidity; methods to allocate costs among program and support functions; and underwater donor-restricted endowment funds.

ASU 2014-09, "Revenue from Contracts with Customers," is effective for the Diocese's financial statements for the year ending December 31, 2019 (as amended by ASU 2015-14). This amendment provides guidance for revenue recognition related to contracts with transfer of promised goods or services to customers and related disclosures.

ASU 2017-02, "Leases (Topic 842)," effective for the Diocese's financial statements for the year ending December 31, 2020. This amendment will require lessees to recognize assets and liabilities on the statement of financial position for the rights and obligations created by all leases with terms of more than twelve months. Disclosures also will be required by lessees to meet the objective of enabling users of financial statements to assess the amount, timing, and uncertainty of cash flows arising from leases.

Management has not yet determined the impact of these amendments on the Diocese's financial statements.

#### **FAIR VALUE MEASUREMENTS**

Fair value accounting standards provide the framework for measuring fair value. That framework provides a fair value hierarchy that prioritizes the inputs to valuation methods used to measure fair value. This hierarchy consists of three broad levels: Level 1 inputs consist of unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities and have the highest priority; Level 2 inputs consist of observable inputs other than quoted prices for identical assets; and Level 3 inputs have the lowest priority to unobservable inputs.

The Diocese uses the following valuation techniques to measure fair value of assets on a recurring basis. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at December 31, 2017.

Cash and cash equivalents - The carrying amount approximates fair value because of the short-term nature of these investments.

Equity and fixed income securities and mutual funds - Fair values were based on quoted market prices.

#### Investments measured using the net asset value (NAV) per share practical expedient

Certain investments that were measured at net asset value per share (or its equivalent) have not been classified in the fair value hierarchy. The fair value presented in the following notes is intended to permit the reconciliation of the fair value hierarchy to the line items presented in the statement of assets, liabilities and net assets - modified cash basis.

### Common trust funds Large CAP

DJ-UBS Roll Select Commodity Index: The investment objective of the Fund is to approximate as closely as practicable, before expenses, the performance of the Bloomberg Roll Select Commodity Index (sm) over the long term. The per unit net asset value of the Fund is determined each business day based on the quoted market prices of the underlying investments held and for certain holdings, values are derived from indices, reference rates or a combination of these factors.

S&P 500 Common Trust Fund: The investment objective of the Fund is to approximate as closely as practicable, before expenses, the performance of the S&P 500 Index over the long term. The per unit net asset value of the Fund is determined each business day based on the quoted market prices of the underlying investments held and for certain holdings, values are derived from indices, reference rates or a combination of these factors.

#### Small/Mid CAP

S&P Mid CAP Lending: The investment objective of the Fund is to approximate as closely as practicable, before expenses, the performance of the S&P Mid CAP 400 Index over the long term. The per unit net asset value of the Fund is determined each business day based on the quoted market prices of the underlying investments held and for certain holdings, values are derived from indices, reference rates or a combination of these factors.

Small CAP Index: The investment objective of the Fund is to exceed the performance of the Russell 2000 Index over the long term. The per unit net asset value of the Fund is determined each business day based on the quoted market prices of the underlying investments held and for certain holdings, values are derived from indices, reference rates or a combination of these factors.

Active International Small CAP: The investment objective of the Fund is to exceed the performance of the S&P EPAC Small CAP Index over the long term. The per unit net asset value of the Fund is determined each business day based on the quoted market prices of the underlying investments held.

Daily Active Emerging Market: The investment objective of the Fund is to provide a total investment return in excess of the performance of the MSCI Emerging Markets Index over the long term. The per unit net asset value of the Fund is determined each business day based on the quoted market prices of the underlying investments held and for certain holdings, values are derived from indices, reference rates or a combination of these factors.

International Alpha Select: The investment objective of the Fund is to provide a total investment return in excess of the performance of the MSCI EAFE Index over the long term. The per unit net asset value of the Fund is determined each business day based on the quoted market prices of the underlying investments held and for certain holdings, values are derived from indices, reference rates or a combination of these factors.

#### Diversified equity

Dow Jones AIG Commodity Index: The investment objective is to approximate as closely as practicable, before expenses, the performance of the Bloomberg Commodity Total Return Index (sm). The per unit net asset value of the Fund is determined each business day based on the quoted market prices of the underlying investments held and for certain holdings, values are derived from indices, reference rates or a combination of these factors.

The per unit net asset value of the Fund is determined each business day based on the quoted market prices of the underlying investments held.

SPDR Dow Jones International Real Estate Fund: The investment objective is to provide investment results, that, before fees and expense, correspond generally to the total return performance of an index based upon the international real estate market. In seeking this objective, the Fund uses a sampling strategy. The per unit net asset value of the Fund is determined by dividing the value of total assets less total liabilities by the number of units outstanding.

#### Fixed income

High Yield: The investment objective of the Fund is to exceed the performance of the Bloomberg Barclays U.S. Corporate High Yield 2% Issuer CAP Index over the long term. The per unit net asset value of the Fund is determined each business day based on holdings in which the values are derived from indices, reference rates or a combination of these factors.

Intermediate Credit Index: The investment objective of the Fund is to exceed the performance of the Bloomberg Barclays U.S. Intermediate Credit Bond Index. The per unit value of the Fund is determined each business day based on holdings in which the values are determined using market based factors such as credit, liquidity, interest rate conditions, issuer-specific factors such as creditworthiness of the issuer and likelihood of full repayment at maturity.

The per unit net asset value of the Fund is determined each business day and is determined by dividing the value of total assets less total liabilities by the number of units outstanding.

TCW Emerging Markets Income Fund: The investment objective of the Fund is to seek high total return from current income and capital appreciation by investing at least 80% of the value of its net assets in debt securities issued or guaranteed by companies, financial institutions and government entities in emerging market countries. The net asset value per share is determined by dividing the Fund's net assets attributable to each class by the number of shares issued and outstanding of that class on each day the New York Stock Exchange is open for trading.

Treasury Inflation Protected Securities: The investment objective of the Fund is to approximate as closely as practicable, before expenses, the performance of the Bloomberg Barclays U.S. Treasury Inflation Protected Securities (TIPS) Index over the long term. The per unit net asset value of the Fund is determined each business day based on the quoted market prices of the underlying investments held.

The preceding methods may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, although the Diocese believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

#### Changes in fair value levels

The availability of observable market data is monitored to assess the appropriate classification of financial instruments within the fair value hierarchy. Changes in economic conditions or model-based valuation techniques may require the transfer of financial instruments from one fair value level to another. In such instances, the transfer is reported at the beginning of the reporting period.

Gains and losses (realized and unrealized) included in changes in value for the period above are reflected in the statements of support and revenue, expenses and other changes in net assets - modified cash basis. There were no transfers in or out of the level 3 in 2017 or 2016, except as related to the adoption of ASU 2015-07 which removed investments for which fair value is measured using net asset per share (practical expedient) from fair value measurement categorization.

#### ENDOWMENT FUNDS

Endowments consist of various investment funds established primarily for operating needs of the Diocese and includes donor-restricted endowment funds. As required by accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, net assets associated with endowment funds are classified and reported based on Pennsylvania state law and the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions.

Investment Return Objectives, Risk Parameters, and Strategies - The Diocese has adopted written investment and spending policies, approved by the Council of Trustees, for endowment assets that attempt to provide a predictable stream of funding to programs supported by its endowment funds while also maintaining the purchasing power of those endowment assets over the long-term. Investment risk is measured in terms of the total endowment fund. Investment assets and allocation between asset classes and strategies are managed to not expose the fund to unacceptable levels of risk. Endowment assets are managed by a committee of the Council of Trustees and are invested in a well-diversified asset-mix, which includes equity and debt securities.

Spending Policy - The Diocese is governed by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania's Act 141. Act 141 is a total return policy that allows a nonprofit to treat a percentage of the average market value of the endowment's investments as income each year. The Diocese established a policy of appropriating for distribution each year a range of 2% to 7% of the average annual value of the endowment assets over the prior three years. For 2017 and 2016, the Diocese used a 5% and a 4% distribution rate, respectively. In establishing these policies, the Diocese considered the long-term expected return on its investment assets, the nature and duration of the individual endowment funds, many of which must be maintained in perpetuity because of donor-restrictions, and the possible effects of inflation.

### CONTINGENCIES

Certain parishes of the Diocese have entered into loans which have been co-signed by an Officer of the Diocese. In the event of default, the Diocese may be obligated to pay the unpaid portion of the defaulted obligations. The outstanding balance of such loans at December 31, 2017 and 2016 was approximately \$ 404,185 and \$ 50,000, respectively.

### POSTRETIREMENT BENEFITS OTHER THAN PENSIONS

The Diocese provides the cost of a health insurance supplement policy to its retired clergy for life. The primary plan for these benefits is one administered by an agency of the national church (the Episcopal Church Clergy and Employees). For 2017 and 2016, the monthly premium per clergy totaled approximately \$ 3,600 a month. The total paid for the years ending 2017 and 2016 totaled \$ 42,693 and \$ 43,924, respectively.

### RETIREMENT PLAN

The Diocese participates in a defined benefit plan and a defined contribution plan. The defined benefit plan is a multi-employer plan maintained for the benefit of clergy and administered by the Church Pension Fund on behalf of the Episcopal Church. The Diocese's contributions in 2017 and 2016 to the plan were \$ 52,856 and \$ 46,772, respectively. The Diocese's relative position in this plan is not readily determinable.

The defined contribution plan covers substantially all eligible lay employees. The provisions of the plan permit the employees to make tax-deferred contributions to the plan not to exceed IRS limitations. The plan also permits the Diocese to make discretionary contributions to the plan. The Diocese's 2017 and 2016 contributions were \$ 15,933 and \$ 14,129, respectively.

### **RELATED PARTIES**

The Diocese provides grants to parishes within its region for the purpose of assisting congregations with major structural and renovation projects as well as assistance with certain qualified projects. During 2017 and 2016, the Diocese provided \$ 165,573 and \$ 167,703, respectively, in funding. By virtue of being member parishes, these transactions are considered related party in nature.

The Diocese is affiliated with the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America. As part of that affiliation, in 2017 and 2016 the Diocese committed \$ 248,110 and \$ 289,992, respectively, in support of the national church. In addition, the Diocese participates in various health and benefit plans as provide by the national church. Refer to the pension plan disclosure for further details.

### CONCENTRATIONS

The Diocese revenues for the Missionary Budget Fund include amounts received from the sixty-two parishes within its Central Pennsylvania diocese. The parish assessment revenue represents 42.6% of the total support and revenue for the Diocese. The continuation of Diocese operations is usually assumed in financial accounting in the absence of evidence to the contrary. The Diocese is subject to the uncertainty as to the amounts of future support.

The Diocese maintains its cash balances in one high-quality financial institution. Accounts are insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation up to \$ 250,000. At December 31, 2017 and 2016, the Diocese's uninsured balances totaled \$ 32,615 and \$ 44,626, respectively.

The Diocese has a line-of-credit with Mid-Penn Bank in the amount of \$ 250,000. Interest is payable monthly based on the prime rate as quoted in the Wall Street Journal subject to a floor rate of 3.75%. Principal is due on demand. The line-of-credit is secured by inventory, chattel paper, accounts, equipment and general intangibles. At year-end 2017 and 2016 there was no outstanding balance.
