In the Lower Susquehanna Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, we feed the hungry as we have beenfed by Christ. In 2016, our synod became a Reconciling in Christ Synod. We welcome with full participation and inclusionall who are seeking God's love and grace. We welcome all because God welcomes all, regardless of race or culture, sexual orientation, gender identity, or relationship status. The Collaborative Mission Center (CMC), a partnership between the Episcopal Diocese of Central PA, The Dean T. As part of our synod's commitment to justice formation, and in support of our vision to birth a Justice Academy, we are excited to partner with the Stevenson School for Ministry to offer a new Social Justice Missioner Certificate engaging the fundamental issues at the heart of racial justice.
